Forklift Safety Equipment - There are different industries and operations, like for instance warehousing, agricultural and manufacturing which utilize powered industrial trucks along with forklift trucks or lift trucks on a regular basis within the workplace. Forklift trucks are used to lower or raise things or transport things that are stored in containers or on pallets to different locations in the place of work. These industrial machinery help to be able to improve productivity at the jobsite by reducing the requirement for excessive physical handling of stuff by employees. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, there are around 20,000 severe injuries every year in America and approximately a hundred fatalities caused by lift truck incidents.

Each different lift truck or forklift has various load capacities. Where a load is concerned, each model would differ for particular forward center gravity and maximum weight. Injuries for staff usually take place from falls from the forklift, forklift overturn, crushing incidents or falls from the forklift. Operator falls can happen as the worker ascends or descends into the driver cab or becomes ejected from the machine in the event of an incident or a collision. Lift trucks can overturn because of being overloaded, or having an unequal center or gravity of the load or traveling over an uneven surface that can cause the vehicle to topple over. It is vital for other co-workers to observe strict preventive policies whenever working in close proximity with the lift truck. Without enough preventive measures, pedestrian co-workers are at risk from accidents or collisions related with an unsafe cargo.

In relation to forklift maintenance, operation and training, there are strict standards and training to be followed. Like for instance, people who are under eighteen years old and are in non-agricultural trades are allowable not to function a forklift truck. It is vital that all lift truck operators must have undergone both practical and theoretical training prior to commencing forklift operation and they are even required to take refresher courses.

The "American National Standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, ANSI B56.1-1969 are the standards which all powered industrial trucks have to comply with. The particular OSHA standards that employees and employers must adhere to as stated in the General Industry Standards comprise 1910.178 "Powered industrial trucks", and standards for Marine Terminals 29 CFR 1917 Subpart C, "Cargo handling gear and equipment" and Long shoring 29 CFR 1918 Subpart G, "Cargo handling gear and equipment other than ship's gear.

There are various other regulations and directives that are essential for employers to be aware of. The NIOSH and OSHA both comprehensively outline regulations or signpost employees and employers to all regulations which apply.
